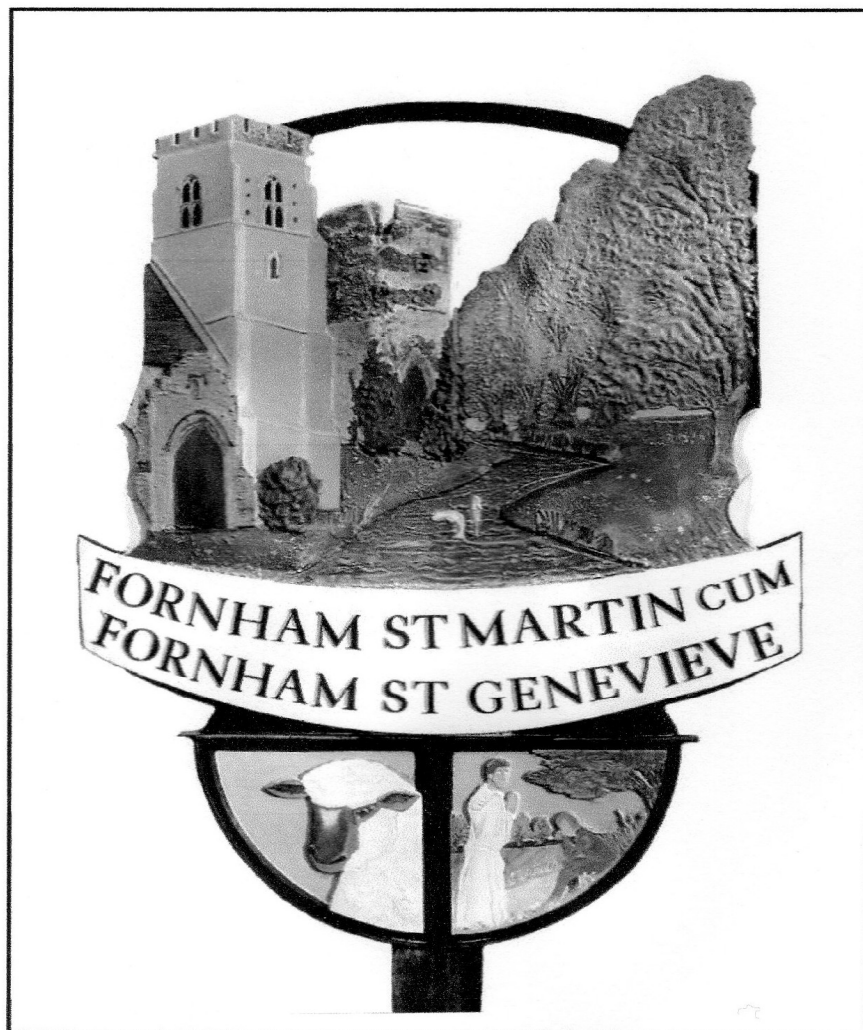

Well Christmas is over again for another year, and what a joyous and busy time it was. Our crib service on Christmas Eve was as popular as ever, and with the extra chairs everyone had a seat this year. Some 125 children, parents, grandparents and friends filled the Church to sing carols, bless the tree all gaily decorated and lit up and hear the Christmas story. The children placed all the characters of Jesus, Mary and Joseph in the model stable, surrounded by the animals, then sat on the chancel steps to sing *Away in a Manger*, beautifully. Although we couldn't manage a Nativity Play this year, our Rector, David Burrell, divided the congregation into sections, and as each part of the story was told, each section joined in with responses, and it was all great fun and laughter. We finished with a few prayers to remind us of why we were there.

## FORNHAM LADIES CLUB



Our Speaker for November was Mrs. Christine James and her subject was "Fantasy Dolls". Fantasy Dolls is one of three categories in the international competition held annually for doll makers. Christine holds an Emerald Award, second only to a Diamond Award.

Christine began her talk with a brief history of doll making. Dolls were found with mummies in ancient tombs, were used in witchcraft in the Middle Ages and were made for sale as a cottage industry in the 1800s. It was a hazardous occupation as women suffered lung damage from dust, lead poisoning from the paint and eyestrain from the lack of adequate lighting.

Christine had two beautiful dolls on display, one was dressed as the Snow Queen and the other as a Queen of the Night. She started making the head by dipping a mould in slip, firing it and then polishing, until it became very smooth porcelain. The head was then painted to create shading which defined the contours and character of the face and it was then painted to produce the skin colour required. Christine had been taught how to paint eyes by an international judge. She passed round a finished head and to look into its eyes was almost uncanny.

The Snow Queen clothing included a shimmering overskirt, a cape edged with swansdown, a silver coronet and fine silver leather boots. The coronet was made by dipping a small scrap of lace into slip and firing it several times - the lace burnt away and left its image on the porcelain which, now painted silver, looked and felt like metal. Many hundred of hours went into the making of the finished doll and it could have had up to ten firings - each one a potential disaster if not carefully controlled. This is definitely a hobby for the very talented artist.

Peter Morris, a judge for the Royal Horticultural Society, paid his second visit to the club on December 11th when he showed slides to prove the title of his talk ' A Flower for every day of the year, beginning in January with the delightful aconite followed by the all welcoming winter into spring favourites of snowdrops and crocus, iris unguicularis, daffodils etc. Peter maintained an interesting commentary giving brief tips on growing and maintaining many of the flowers and flowering shrubs he showed us. Brightening up a cold, foggy and frosty evening he moved through summer into autumn with flowers such as lupins and geraniums, fuchsia and penstemon coming round full circle showing us aster, chrysanthemums and winter flowering jasmine. Most of the slides were of plants grown in Peter's own garden showing how attractively he has grouped them to set off their colours and foliage.

**2. APPROVE MINUTES OF 15th NOVEMBER 2012**

The Minutes were signed as a true record.

The Council adjourned for:-

**3. POLICE REPORT**

There was one crime of interest since the November meeting – criminal damage in Russell Baron Road.

**4. BOROUGH/COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT**

In respect of the widening of the path, Councillor Hopfensperger explained the bidding procedures for such works. As this seemed to be somewhat complicated she said she would email the details to the Clerk who would attach them to the minutes, forming part of the full minutes. Councillor Butler said he was astonished to hear about this bidding process as the Parish Council had been asking about path widening for over a year and we have got precisely nowhere. The Chairman and fellow Councillors shared this view. Councillor Hopfensperger said this came under the control of Mr Boor and

she explained that assessments had to be made as to whether there was a sufficient risk before such schemes were undertaken. She understood that a full engineering assessment would be made and how it would be possible to undertake the work in stages. Councillor Hopfensperger said this assessment would be available for the February meeting. Councillor Butler said it was a disgraceful state of affairs; after all ratepayers in the Village pay as much as those in the Town. He felt that we had been totally ineffective and wondered if the Parish Council should go to the press to highlight the situation. After further discussion, it was agreed to request/invite Mr Boor to the February meeting to appraise Councillors of the Borough's current thinking on improvement schemes in villages and to answer questions to our concerns.

On flashing warning lights, Councillor Hopfensperger said the lights should be trialed commencing 20th February. We will then be told how long they will be in place. The Clerk was given the contact as Anthony Smith. The question was raised about the sign which All Saints had some time ago. This was something which had been arranged for many months, following a traffic survey which was carried out by All Saints PC. The Clerk would contact the Chairman of All Saints to see how they organised their survey. They share a speed gun with Honington.

Councillor Hopfensperger said that whilst street light number 21 was now working, there was a part which required replacing. No 8 would be attended to at the same time (both lights at Barton Hill). The contact for the Clerk is Richard Webster. From the floor, Mr Yates said that a light opposite Fornham House was out. Councillor Hopfensperger said she would let the lighting team know.

Councillor Hopfensperger gave details of the "Stay Safe" scheme to be implemented in Bury.

She also gave details of a new oyster travel card for young people in Suffolk.

The Kytson road sign would be moved.

Councillor Butler asked if we could have a full list of contacts within the Borough and Suffolk County Council. Councillor Hopfensperger said she would arrange this.

The Chairman asked Councillor Hopfensperger how the Lark Valley footpath works were funded, particularly since it is used infrequently. She said the work had been scheduled for many years. Some money came from the rights of way budget and some from the disability budget. She would let the Clerk have full details.

The Chairman said, in the light of the proposed extension to Carrs premises, he was concerned about the lack of a 30mph sign near the Tollgate. With increased delivery vehicle movements, he could envisage a problem with speeding traffic going past their entrance. This was the third time he had mentioned this. Councillor Hopfensperger said she would she what she could do about this. Councillor Hopfensperger said Suffolk County Council had written to the owner of the house in the Drift, who they say is definitely responsible for the damaged wall. Councillor Hopfensperger would let the Clerk have more details on this matter.

The Chairman asked Councillor Hopfensperger (for the third time) to look into the issue of the path opposite Flint Cottages as the edges, now exposed after cutting back and clearing the ditch, were crumbling and dangerous. Would she also draw the highways attention to pot holes in the road on the way to Culford.

The Chairman asked about progress on the sharing of services between the Borough and Forest Heath and wondered whether this potential upheaval, whilst necessary, is contributing to the poor response performance. Councillor Hopfensperger said this would take some while as the decision was to take department by department and not to attempt to change everything at once.

Councillor Hopfensperger said with regard to the Fornham Lock Bridge, an order to keep the weight restriction had been made. Any work to be carried out would not take place until August. Councillor Youngs asked about the weight restriction in the Street and Barton Hill. Councillor Hopfensperger would keep this issue in mind.

On path clearing, councillor Hopfensperger said Mr Boor had agreed to reimburse the Parish Council as in previous years. She would ask that this is confirmed in writing.

Councillor Hopfensperger said she would contact Jackie Fisher to obtain a full listing of TPO's in the Village, as the Clerk had met with a nil response.

The Chairman thanked Councillor Hopfensperger for attending and for her valuable help.

Councillor Butler felt Councillors should think about how best the Parish Council could engage with the public to campaign for more positive action from the Borough and Suffolk County Council. This would be an item on the February agenda.

#### **5. AGENDA ITEMS OF INTEREST TO THE PUBLIC**

From the Floor, Mr Yates said the end of year accounts should be out in February when a clear picture of finances would be seen. If he felt the need for a discussion with the Parish Council on funding, in the light of the accounts, he would let the Clerk know so the matter could be placed on the agenda for the next available PC meeting.

Councillor Butler felt that the "Village Fête" should be named "Church Fête" since all proceeds actually went to the St Martin and All Saints churches.

The Council reconvened

Councillor Hubbard said there had not been a meeting on which to report. Councillors were concerned about the new heating system as it did not adequately heat the room. The Clerk would inform Mrs Barbara Hill about this.

*Playing Field*

A recent play equipment inspection by the Borough had highlighted the fact that the access ramp on the multiplay was rotting. Councillor Forster would take a look and report back.

Mr Bird had sent his quotation in respect of cutting the playing field for the coming season. The figure was £567 plus VAT. Councillors unanimously agreed to accept.

SE/12/1074//HH The Coach House, Fornham Park. Extension to existing garage to provide a double car port in the style of a traditional cart lodge. GRANTED

SE/12/1136 The Coach House, Fornham Park. Extension of modern garage to provide double car port. GRANTED

The following applications had been dealt with earlier at a planning meeting.

SE/12/1600/HH 6 Turnberry Drive. Erection of single storey rear extension.

Councillors decided to object to this application of the grounds that

- 1.** This is a gross over development of the site.
- 2.** Is disproportionate with other properties.
- 3.** Should this application be granted, there would be loss of sunlight and daylight to properties in Wentworth Close.
- 4.** Should this be granted, this would have a detrimental effect on the values of adjacent properties.

SE/12/1514/ADV. The Croft, Old Hall Lane. Erection of a single storey side extension and construction of vehicular access, following demolition of garage and conservatory. NO OBJECTION

SE/12/1514/ADV Carrs. Provision of 3 number internally illuminated fascia signs and 4 number illuminated flags and one number illuminated P4 pylon. NO OBJECTION

The following application was discussed

SE/12/1626/FUL Maryland, 2 Church Close. Erection of new garage and construction of new vehicular access, following the demolition of existing garage and existing access to be blocked off. Insertion of a roof light to the front elevation. Councillors did not object to this application but they raised concerns about the proposed new access which is on a blind bend.

An email was to hand from Val Seaman re the Website with various ideas for improvements. The Clerk would discuss these with her as Councillors were anxious to improve information for parishioners.

A letter requesting a donation from MAGPAS was to hand. The Clerk would reply, stating the Parish Council only supports local groups.

The email from Councillor Trevor Beckwith re the over development of Bury was received.

The letter re Suffolk Fire and rescue Service Stakeholder Consultation was received.

Councillor Griffiths Christmas email had been circulated.

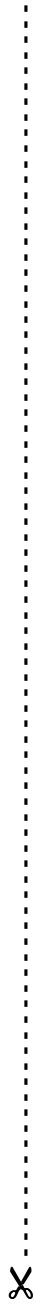

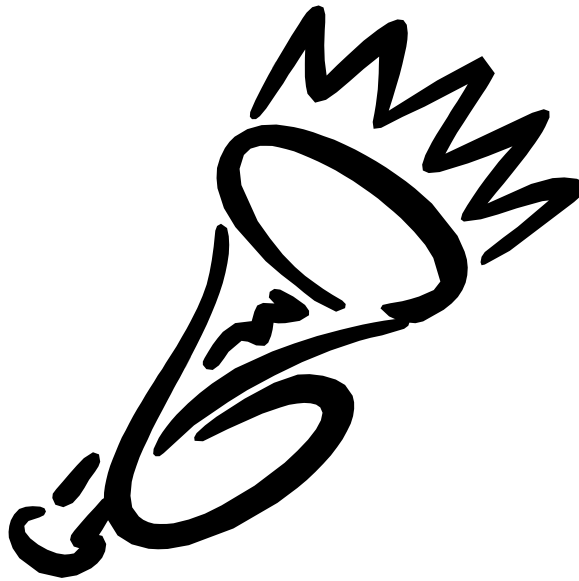
